

EVENT SAFETY AND SECURITY RULES

for spaces mgt GmbH

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1. Scope of application

These Event Safety and Security Rules for spaces mgt GmbH (hereinafter referred to as the "Location Manager") apply to the holding of events in and on the premises of the event locations FREDENHAGEN (Offenbach), CURIO-HAUS (Hamburg), PALAIS (Frankfurt am Main), THE FRAME (Düsseldorf), and VILCO (Bad Vilbel) which are hereinafter referred to as the "Event Locations" or an "Event Location". They are based on the requirements of the State Regulation on Constructing and Operating Event Locations applicable in the respective federal state (Hessen: HVStättR, NRW: SBauVO, Hamburg: VStättVO, Berlin: BetrVO; hereinafter referred to jointly as the Event Location Regulations) and set out the legal obligations of the Location Manager and the Event Organizer with respect to holding events according to the stipulations of Sec. 38(5) VStättVO. The Event Organizer shall oblige his service providers to comply with the security and fire safety requirements.

Additional requirements regarding security and fire safety for a particular event may be imposed by the building supervisory authorities, the fire safety authorities, the police, and the Location Manager, where the nature or scope of the planned event give rise to particular risks to persons and property.

2. Obligations to give notice and obtain approvals

2.1 Obligations to give notice prior to the event

The Event Organizer is required to provide to the Location Manager in writing all organizational and technical details and to notify him of the start of the event, the admission times, the end of the event, and the planned layout of the hall(s), rooms and spaces no later than 4 weeks prior to the event, and to coordinate such with the Location Manager. The Location Manager reserves the right to provide the Event Organizer with an (electronic) data form in order to collect these data. This form shall be used for this event only and all necessary event data shall be provided. The Location Manager reserves the right to transmit these data to public authorities and agencies associated with the event (public order office, police, fire service, buildings regulation office, first aid/emergency services, and private security services). The data required from the Event Organizer includes, in particular:

- the name and contact details of a representative of the Event Organizer who shall be present during the event and has decision-making powers;
- whether he will be bringing with him members of staff who are "responsible for event technology" who will oversee the installation and dismantling of such and the event itself;
- the dimensions and layout of any stage areas/stages/platforms, runways, forestages, podiums, and comparable erections which he intends to set up;
- the anticipated number of attendees and expected audience profile;
- whether he plans to enforce bag checks and security screening at entrances;
- whether stage, studio, lighting or other technical facilities will be brought onto the premises;
- whether technical facilities will be moved or modified during the event;
- whether there will be routines or artistic performances involving the use of mechanics, to be performed in or above the auditorium;
- whether he is planning activities that pose a fire safety risk/the use of pyrotechnics, or the use of laser systems or smoke machines (these are subject to additional mandatory approval);
- whether decorations/furnishings/props will be brought onto the premises (fire safety classes to be verified according to Event Location Regulations);
- whether the Event Organizer is planning a "Technical Rehearsal" before the event.

Based on the information provided by the Event Organizer, the Location Manager will conduct a safety assessment prior to the event which will subsequently be used as the basis for planning the necessary safety and security measures and, in particular, the necessity for and required number of qualified event staff and external labor (fire service, first aid, security service) (cf. §§ 40 to 43 VStättVO). Should the Event Organizer fail to provide such information, or if such information is provided late or is incomplete, the Location Manager may assume an increased risk level. All additional costs incurred as a result of this (e.g. staff costs for a higher number of security staff) shall be borne by the Event Organizer. If incorrect information is provided, this may result in a restriction, cancellation or termination of the event.

2.2 Technical rehearsals

If stage areas with more than 200 m² of green space are to be used and in the event of guest performances where said guests have their own stage setup, a closed technical rehearsal with full stage setup should generally be performed prior to the first event, unless such is not necessary due to the nature of the event or the scope of the stage setup (provided this is not objected to). The Location Manager shall decide whether or not a rehearsal must be conducted based on the information provided according to § 2.1 above (in consultation with the building supervisory authorities). If a rehearsal is required, the Event Organizer must coordinate the foreseeable time of the technical rehearsal with the Location Manager in good time.

2.3 Permits and approvals

The event rooms and event spaces are provided on the basis of statutory approved evacuation and seating plans with a set maximum capacity. Changes to the type of use and deviations from the pre-approved evacuation and seating plans, e.g. changes to the layout of chairs or evacuation routes and the setting up of tents, podiums, platforms, special constructions, and flying constructions require the written consent of the Location Manager. Such measures generally require building permits and must be approved by the building supervisory authorities and fire department.

2.4 Costs for public permits and approvals

With respect to the above undertakings and all other undertakings indicated below in these Safety and Security Rules as being subject to proper notice or approval, the Event Organizer may be required to present documentation, plans, reports, test certificates, appraisals, building permits, and fire safety approvals. The Location Manager shall assist the Event Organizer with obtaining approvals from public authorities. The length of and costs for such processes, including the risk of not obtaining approval, shall be borne by the Event Organizer in their entirety. The Event Organizer shall also bear the costs for public permits.

3. Division of responsibility, external services, house rules

3.1 Responsibility of the Event Organizer

The Event Organizer is responsible for the event program and for the safe and smooth running of the event. He shall ensure that the maximum capacity permitted in the event rooms and spaces provided to him is observed. Overcrowding is strictly prohibited. The Event Organizer has a duty to ensure public safety within the Event Location for the duration of his use of the same with respect to any decorations, furnishings, props, erections and installations, suspensions, cables, and stage, studio or lighting technology which he or third parties, whom he has hired, bring onto the premises. He shall comply with the requirements of these Safety and Security Rules and the operating guidelines of the Event Location Regulations and such issued by German Social Accident Insurance (DGUV), in particular DGUV-V 17/18 "Staging and Production Facilities for the Entertainment Industry", with respect to all items and materials he brings onto the premises. Compliance with all other laws and regulations that apply to the event, in particular the Protection of Young Persons Act (Jugendschutzgesetz), the Sunday and Public Holidays Act (Sonn- und Feiertagsgesetz), the Working Hours Act (Arbeitszeitgesetz; AZG), the Act on the Safety and Health Protection of Workers at Work (Arbeitsschutzgesetz), the Act on Protection of Non-Smokers (Nichtraucherschutzgesetz), the Industrial Code (Gewerbeordnung), and regulations on imissions and waste management also falls under the responsibility of the Event Organizer.

The Event Organizer is required to observe the safety and security concept in place for the Event Location and to implement this concept in coordination with the Location Manager. Where necessary for the event in question, the Location Manager shall provide the Event Organizer with the safety and security concept documents he requires (pocket maps for in case of emergency etc.) to be used for his event only. The Location Manager is entitled to demand that the Event Organizer prepare and implement an event-specific safety and security concept for events that are subject to special risks.

3.2 Representatives of the Event Organizer with decision-making powers

The Event Organizer shall appoint a representative with decision-making powers (see § 2.1) who shall be present for the entire duration of the event and shall notify the Location Manager of who this person is. Upon request of the Location Manager, this authorized representative shall attend an inspection of the Event Location together with the Location Manager and shall familiarize himself with the event spaces, including emergency exits and evacuation routes. Upon request of the Location Manager, the authorized representative shall also attend a coordination/instruction session regarding the applicable safety and security rules prior to the event. The authorized representative of the Event Organizer shall ensure that the event runs safely and securely. He is required to be present during the running of the event, must be available at all times, and where necessary shall cooperate with the contact partner appointed by the Location Manager, and with public authorities and relevant external services (fire service, police, building regulatory authorities, public order office, first aid service), in order to make decisions that are necessary to ensure the safety of attendees. He is obliged to terminate the event where this is necessary due to a particularly hazardous situation which poses a concrete danger to persons.

3.3 Event manager

The role of event manager according to § 38(2) and (5) VStättVO shall in principle be assumed by the Location Manager for the duration of the event. The Location Manager reserves the right to demand of the Event Organizer that his authorized representative assume the role of event manager for the duration of the event. In such case, the Event Organizer's event manager shall be assisted by a qualified person designated by the Location Manager who has decision-making powers. The Location Manager is entitled to pass on costs incurred as a result of assuming the role of event manager to the Event Organizer.

3.4 Technical staff of the Location Manager, responsibility for event technology, event technology specialists

All technical building facilities at the Event Location may be operated by qualified members of staff of the Location Manager only. The Event Organizer shall ensure that he engages the necessary qualified staff for any technical erections and installations he brings onto the premises according to §§ 39, 40 VStättVO. The Event Organizer shall notify the Location Manager of the required qualified staff no later than four weeks prior to the event. Insofar as the technical installations of the Event Organizer are simple in nature and scope, the Location Manager can take charge of managing and supervising the installation and dismantling of such and also operating such pursuant to § 40(2) to (4) VStättVO at the expense of the Event Organizer. In such case, the Event Organizer shall, upon request of the Location Manager, appoint employees who will be in charge of managing and coordinating the works in accordance with labor laws during installation and dismantling.

3.5 Responsibility of the Location Manager

The Location Manager and any persons he commissions are entitled and obliged to conduct random spot checks to ensure that the Event Organizer is complying with the guidelines of the Event Location Regulations/VStättVO and these Safety and Security Rules. Such persons shall be granted access to the event rooms and spaces at all times for this purpose.

3.6 Entry screening, safety and security service, tour security

The duties laid out in the Event Location Regulations/VStättVO are the responsibility of the safety and security service. This service shall be appointed by the Location Manager at the expense of the Event Organizer, via an external service partner authorized by the Location Manager. The number of security personnel required shall be determined, *inter alia*, by the nature of the event, the number of attendees, potential event-related risks, external risks, and any additional requirements of public authorities. Consequently, the Location Manager usually does not give notice of the exact number of security personnel required until shortly before the event in question, based on the risk assessment conducted for this event. Upon request, the Event Organizer will be informed of the number of security staff foreseeably required upon conclusion of contract, as far as this is possible.

Where the Event Organizer engages his own "tour security" as personal protection for artists etc., the Location Manager shall retain the authority to issue instructions according to the stipulations of § 3.8.

3.7 Fire service (fire safety patrol) and first aid

The Location Manager shall give notice of these services prior to the event based on the risk assessment conducted for the event. The scope of these services (number of persons to be engaged) depends on the nature of the event, the number of attendees, the safety and security rules applicable to the specific event, and any stipulations issued by the public authorities for the individual event. The Event Organizer shall bear the costs for these services.

3.8 Enforcing house rules

According to these Safety and Security Rules and the applicable house rules, the Event Organizer has the authority to enforce house rules against event attendees and commissioned third parties in the rooms and spaces provided to him, in addition to the Location Manager. The Location Manager furthermore has the authority to enforce house rules against the Event Organizer and also against attendees and third parties for as long as the event rooms and spaces are made available. The security services who have been engaged shall assist in the enforcement of the house rules.

The Event Organizer shall intervene immediately in the case of breaches of the house rules, these Safety and Security Rules, legal regulations relating to the event, or the instructions of public authorities. Should the Event Organizer fail to act immediately, following prior urging, the Location Manager shall be entitled to act in his stead and at his expense (substitute performance). If such substitute performance is not possible or is unreasonable, or if the Event Organizer rejects such substitute performance or refuses to assume the costs for such, the Location Manager may, as a last resort, demand that the Event Organizer vacate and return the event spaces provided to him. Should the Event Organizer fail to comply with such a request, the Location Manager shall be entitled to order that the event be terminated and the Event Location vacated, and to have such order enforced at the expense and risk of the Event Organizer.

4. House regulations concerning security and fire safety

4.1 Public safety, evacuation routes, safety and security installations

4.1.1 Driving on the premises

The German Highway Code (Straßenverkehrsordnung, StVO) is in force on the entire premises of the Event Location. Walking speed must be maintained everywhere on the premises. The driving of vehicles of any kind is done so at the risk of the vehicle operator. The Location Manager has the right to subject the cargo compartments of goods vehicles and containers which are in the possession of persons to inspections upon entering and exiting the premises. Depending on the progress of installation and dismantling activities due to other events running simultaneously, the premises may be temporarily closed to vehicular traffic.

4.1.2 Forklifts and hand pallet trucks

The Event Organizer and any companies he engages are permitted to drive motorized equipment, such as forklifts, around the hall and foyer areas with the consent of the Location Manager only. Exemptions require the prior consent of the Location Manager. The Event Organizer is permitted to transport heavy loads using manually operated equipment (e.g. hand pallet trucks). The Event Organizer or any companies he engages shall familiarize themselves with the permitted floor load capacity and floor condition prior to moving loads about the Event Location.

4.1.3 Fire service access zones

Access zones required by the fire service and marked as 'No waiting in this area' must be kept clear at all times. Vehicles and items which are left in places that block evacuation routes and safety zones will be removed at the expense and risk of the owner. Hydrants in the Event Location and outside must not be obstructed, blocked or disguised.

4.1.4 Emergency exits, fire escapes, hallways, corridors

These evacuation routes must be kept clear at all times. It must be possible to open the doors on evacuation routes to the full extent from the inside with minimal effort. Evacuation routes, emergency exits, fire escapes and the signage for such must not be blocked, covered or otherwise disguised. Hallways and corridors must not be blocked or restricted by items at any time. Hallways and corridors act as exits in case of emergency. Fire and smoke doors must not be wedged open or held open using any other objects.

4.1.5 Safety and security installations

Fire alarms, hydrants, fire extinguishers and fire controls, smoke flaps, smoke extraction system sensors, smoke alarms,

telephones, air intakes and outlets on heating and ventilation systems, smoke ventilation systems and their warning symbols, and green emergency exit signs must be accessible and visible at all times; they must not be blocked, covered or otherwise disguised.

4.2 Erections and installations for events

4.2.1 Technical facilities of the Location Manager

All existing, permanent technical building facilities may in principle be operated only by the staff of the Location Manager or contractually authorized service companies affiliated with the Location Manager. This also applies to all connections that are required to the Location Manager's utilities (e.g. energy, water, telecommunications). Unless otherwise agreed, the Event Organizer has no right to demand that the Location Manager remove his own technical installations from the event spaces.

4.2.2 Technical facilities of the Event Organizer

Technical facilities brought onto the premises by the Event Organizer or by companies he has commissioned to do so must satisfy the generally accepted regulations for the relevant technology, in particular the requirements of the Accident Prevention Regulations DGUV-V 17 and DGUV-V 3, including the relevant information and execution guidelines (cf. BGI 810) regarding safety and functionality. Electrical (switch) systems must not be accessible to attendees and must be secured accordingly. The Event Organizer and service companies he has engaged shall ensure that installation and dismantling activities do not obstruct or endanger other works. Where necessary, the Event Organizer shall appoint coordinators who will coordinate such works.

4.2.3 Erections and installations, stage areas, special constructions

All erections and installations in the Event Location and the erection of flying constructions on the premises of the Event Location are subject to proper notice and, where applicable, approval. The Event Organizer is responsible for public safety with respect to all areas which he uses, including erections and installations brought into such areas. Erections and installations must not impair the function of fire safety installations (e.g. automatic fire extinguishers, smoke curtains). Erections and installations shall be set up in such a way that dynamic vibrations cannot negatively affect their structural stability. The substructure of the floors of podiums, stage areas and platforms must be made of non-combustible materials. Slightly flammable materials, or materials producing flaming droplets or toxic gases must not be used under any circumstances. DIN 4102 and EN 13501-1 (Reaction to fire, Building materials) must be observed respectively. The Location Manager may demand presentation of an official test certificate verifying the material class and required material properties.

4.2.4 Suspended installations

For safety reasons, suspended installations on ceilings and support structures must be installed by qualified professionals only. The Event Organizer shall notify the Location Manager of any necessary suspended installations prior to the event and shall coordinate such with the Location Manager. Suspended installations must be installed according to all generally accepted rules for the technology. The load limits stipulated must be observed. In case of doubt, a static assessment of the suspended installations shall be ordered at the expense of the Event Organizer.

4.2.5 Carpets, flooring

Carpets or other flooring shall be laid in such a way that they do not create slipping or tripping hazards for persons. Carpets and other flooring shall be laid safely. Carpets and flooring may only be fixed in place using adhesive tape that does not leave behind marks when removed. Self-adhesive carpet tiles are not permitted. All materials used must be removed without leaving marks. The same applies to substances such as oils, grease and paints.

4.2.6 Railings

If standing areas are set up in front of stage areas for attendees of concert events, then the audience area shall be separated from the stage area by railings such that there is a walkway of at least 2 meters width between the stage area and the railings to allow security and emergency services access.

4.2.7 Glass

For glass constructions, only safety glass may be used. The edges of glass panes must be worked or protected such that there is no risk of injury. Full-glass components at eye level (160cm) must be marked. For glass constructions, the stipulations of the "Technical Regulations for Using Accident-Proof Glazing Barriers (TRAV)" must be observed.

4.2.8 Bolts, holes, nails

The attaching of bolts and anchors, the hammering in of nails, and the drilling and boring of holes is prohibited. Shooting bolts is also not permitted. The Location Manager shall make decisions regarding exemptions.

4.3 Decorations, furnishings, props

4.3.1 Decorations

Materials, decorations and hangings used to decorate the event must be made at least of not easily flammable material (B1 according to DIN 4102 or at least Class C according to EN 13501-1). Decorations in necessary corridors, hallways and staircases (evacuation routes) must be made of non-combustible materials (A according to DIN 4102 or A1 according to DIN EN 13501-1). Materials which are being reused must be re-inspected to ensure that they are still not easily flammable and re-impregnated as necessary. The Location Manager may demand presentation of an official test certificate verifying the required material properties.

All materials brought onto the premises must be kept far enough away from sources of ignition, spotlights and sources of heat

that they cannot ignite. Decorations must be attached directly to walls, ceilings or furnishings. (Free) hanging decorations are permitted in the space only if they are suspended at least 2.50 m above floor level and do not have any negative impact on the function of automatic fire extinguisher systems. Decorations made from natural plant materials may be used in the spaces only for as long as they are fresh. Bamboo, reed, hay, straw, bark mulch, turf, (pine) trees without bales, or similar materials do not generally satisfy the above requirements. The Location Manager shall make decisions regarding exemptions in consultation with the relevant authority.

4.3.2 Furnishings

Furnishings which are part of stage scenery, e.g. wall, floor and ceiling elements, must be made at least of not easily flammable materials. Certificates verifying that such items are not easily flammable shall be presented upon request of the Location Manager.

4.3.3 Props

Props are furnishings used on stages and in scenery. This includes, in particular, furniture, lighting, pictures and crockery. These must be made at least of normal-flammable materials.

4.4 Special provisions concerning security and fire safety

4.4.1 Open flames, flammable liquids, gases, pyrotechnics

The use of open flames, flammable liquids, gases, pyrotechnics, explosive substances, and other highly flammable materials is prohibited. Exemptions apply insofar as the use of such is justified by the nature of the event and the Event Organizer has coordinated the fire safety measures required in each case with the Location Manager and relevant authority. The use of pyrotechnics must be approved by the relevant authorities and supervised by a suitable professional according to the law on explosives. Evidence that this professional holds a license and suitable qualification must be presented. The Event Organizer is responsible for obtaining the permit. The costs incurred for public permits and for making the event safe with respect to the use of pyrotechnics shall also be borne by the Event Organizer.

4.4.2 Candles, kitchen equipment and heating equipment

The use of candles and similar sources of light as table decorations and the use of open flames in designated kitchen equipment for preparing food is permitted with the consent of the Location Manager only ("safely contained candlelight").

4.4.3 Combustible packaging materials

Combustible packaging materials must be removed from the Event Location by the Event Organizer immediately. Packaging material, waste or leftover materials must not be stored under or on stages, platforms or podiums under any circumstances.

4.4.4 Vehicles

Vehicles with combustion engines may only be parked in the halls with a maximum of 5 liters of fuel in their tank. The fuel tank must be closed and the ignition key must not be in the vehicle. Depending on the event and where the vehicle is parked, further safety and security measures may also be necessary, such as intertization of the fuel tank, disconnecting the batteries, and/or assigning security personnel. For vehicles with alternative drive systems, e.g. electric or hybrid vehicles, the batteries must be disconnected from the drive system using safety clamp connectors (main switch). For gas-powered vehicles, the pressure tank must be emptied.

Alternative agreements based on the regulations of the relevant fire safety authorities in the federal state where the Event Location is located will be communicated by the Location Manager individually.

4.4.5 Working with open flames, welding, abrasive cutting work and hot work

All types of "open flame activities and hot work" are prohibited in the Event Location. Exemptions are permitted subject to the prior written consent of the Location Manager only.

4.4.6 Electrical cables

Electrical cables must be laid such that they cannot generate unsafe levels of heat (unwound, spread over a larger area and sufficiently ventilated). Potential tripping hazards caused by cables, lines or ramps must be clearly signposted.

4.4.7 Use of balloons, drones and remote control aircraft

The use of balloons filled with safety gas and other flying objects, including drones, in the halls and outdoor spaces is subject to prior application and approval by the Location Manager. The use of flying objects and drones while attendees are present in the halls and outdoor spaces is generally prohibited. The operation of such flying objects or aircraft must not obstruct or damage safety installations at any time.

4.5 Health and safety in the workplace, environmental safety

4.5.1 Health and safety in the workplace

All installation and dismantling activities shall be conducted under observance of the applicable provisions of labor law and accident prevention regulations, in particular DGUV-V 1 "Prevention", DGUV-V3 and DGUV-V17/18, and the DGUV information sheet on "Safety for events and productions". The Event Organizer and any companies he has engaged are personally

responsible for observing the accident prevention regulations and labor law provisions. The Event Organizer and any companies he has engaged shall, in particular, ensure that their installation and dismantling activities do not endanger any other persons who are on the premises of the Event Location. Hazards and safety measures (prohibited activities and mandatory activities) must be labeled and indicated pursuant to ASR A1.3 "Health and safety warning signs" – including at short notice where necessary. Where necessary, the Event Organizer shall make arrangements such that these works are properly coordinated. If this is not possible, he shall temporarily halt work and consult the Location Manager.

4.5.2 Noise levels, noise safety equipment

Event Organizers hosting musical performances where high levels of noise are expected shall assess, under their own responsibility, whether, and if so which, safety measures are required in order to avoid causing injury to attendees. It must be ensured that attendees and third parties do not suffer injury during the event (including the risk of hearing loss) by limiting noise levels appropriately. Part 5 of the set of regulations generally accepted in this regard, DIN 15 905 "Event technology - Sound technology", contains "Measures for preventing the risk of hearing loss among audiences as a result of high noise levels from electro-acoustic sound technology". The Event Organizer shall observe these measures. The Event Organizer shall furthermore make a sufficient quantity of protective equipment (e.g. ear plugs) available free of charge and shall provide these to attendees upon request, unless it can be guaranteed with certainty that attendees cannot suffer injury as a result of excessively high noise levels. This must be clearly announced at the entrance to the Event Location.

4.5.3 Noise control for neighboring residents

The event must not cause an unreasonable noise nuisance to neighboring residents. In the case of music events and events producing particularly high levels of noise, imissions prevention measures shall be implemented upon instruction from the relevant authorities for the duration of the event. These measures shall be paid for by the Event Organizer. When loading and unloading vehicles in the goods-in area of the Event Location between 10:00 pm and 6:00 am, the roller shutters must always be closed. If permitted imissions values are exceeded, this may result in a restriction or termination of the event.

4.5.4 Laser systems

The use of laser systems is subject to prior notice and must be coordinated with the Location Manager. When operating laser systems, the requirements of the Directive on the minimum health and safety requirements regarding the exposure of workers to risks arising from physical agents (artificial optical radiation) (Directive 2006/25/EC), DIN 60825-1, and DIN EN 12254 must be observed. In the case of show lasers, the requirements of DIN 56912 and DGUV information sheet 203-036 "Laser installations for performance and projection purposes" must be additionally observed. Class 3R 3B and Class 4 laser systems must be registered with the relevant supervisory authority before operation and, upon request, must be inspected for technical safety by a publicly appointed and certified expert appraiser. The Event Organizer shall bear the costs of this inspection. The test certificate must be presented to the Location Manager before the event. Written confirmation of appointment of an on-site laser safety officer must be enclosed with this notice.

4.5.5 Smoking ban

There is a general smoking ban in place at the Event Location. The Event Organizer shall ensure that this smoking ban is enforced during the installation, dismantling and running of the event. This smoking ban also applies to the use of e-cigarettes.

4.5.6 Waste management

Waste should be avoided as far as possible during installation/dismantling and the event according to the principles of the German Circular Economy Act (Kreislaufwirtschaftsgesetz) and Waste Act (Abfallgesetz). Waste which is unavoidable must be taken away for environmentally friendly disposal (recycling over landfill). The Event Organizer is obliged to render effective cooperation in this respect.

The Event Organizer shall ensure that all materials (decorations, packaging etc.) and all installations and erections which he or his contractors have brought onto the premises of the Event Location are removed again in full after the end of the event. Only substances and materials which cannot be recycled (and thus become waste) shall be disposed of using the Location Manager's disposal system. Fees apply. The Location Manager must be informed in the event of special waste (waste which is subject to oversight). He will subsequently dispose of such waste separately via an authorized service partner.

4.5.7 Wastewater management

The disposal of solid or liquid waste via the wastewater management network (toilets, sewage systems) is strictly prohibited. If a mobile gastronomy service is employed, it must be ensured that oils and grease are caught separately and taken for disposal separately. Cleaning activities must always be conducted using biodegradable products.

4.5.8 Environmental damage

Environmental damage/contamination in and on the premises of the Event Location (e.g. leaks of LPG, oil, hazardous substances) must be reported to the Location Manager immediately.
